It contributes to improving the economic sufficiency of poor households, prioritizing Pantawid Pamilya beneficiaries, in developing employable skills, securing gainful employment, earning steady and sufficient income, and accessing social security and financial institutions. SLP operates with two tracks: (1) Microenterprise Development-participants who exhibit potential and willingness for entrepreneurship may be provided with Seed capital fund, Cash for building livelihood assets and skills training; (2) Employment Facilitation-participants who are qualified. Households served through micro-enterprise development and employment facilitation.
